BBC (Oct. 12) - The Filipino captain of a Rena Vessel that has grounded off New Zealand and is leaking oil into the sea has been arrested and charged with "operating a vessel in a manner causing unnecessary danger or risk". It is estimated that 350 tons of oil have leaked from the ship which may cause New Zealand's environmental disaster in many decades.

Like the MV Magnolia Ace where AOS Chaplain Fr. Roger C. Manalo, CS had celebrated Mass last Oct. 4, the seafarers onboard enjoyed the Mass and even requested for a Blessing of the Ship. After the Mass and Blessing of the ship, it was like fiesta onboard for all the



seafarers as they felt relief and wellnourished.



AOS Kaohsiung does not only pay visits to ships and celebrate Mass Onboard. They bring useful magazines, newsletters, and other reading materials to the seafarers. They talk and listen to the seafarers; eat and drink with them onboard, and most important, care for them, making them feel they are "at home with special friends" even for a little moment.

Being a Seaman Can Be Easy If You Have Faith


